## Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

#### **GSAB ANNUAL REPORT 2017**

The period from August 2016 to November 2017 has been one of great change and development for Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere Partnership SCIO with March 2017 marking a watershed for the organisation.

#### Period August 2016 to March 2017

With our three-year funding coming to an end in March 2017, there was inevitably an early focus on securing the financial future. In August 2016, Nic Coombey, the Community Learning Officer, took up a new post with Solway Firth Partnership but the impact was mitigated by Nic continuing to work for the Biosphere one day per week and Marie McNulty, the Business Development Officer, stepping up to full time and taking over some of Nic's workload.

Thanks to the continuing commitment of our local authority partners, by the end of March we had secured five-year core funding supplemented by annual commitments from Scottish Natural Heritage and Forestry Commission Scotland. This provides 0.6 FTE for both the Co-ordinator and Business Development roles, plus some financial and administrative support. Through project funding we have managed to expand the business development allocation to full-time and hope that project development will further expand our modest staff base.

Despite staff pressures we continued to effectively deliver on our routine work on communications via the website, electronic newsletters, and liaising with community groups and partners.

The Business Development Officer attended both Dumfries and Galloway and Ayrshire Business Weeks, recruiting new business sign-ups to the Biosphere Charter.

In October 2017 GSAB hosted a three-day UK Biosphere conference in Dumfries which Dumfries and Galloway Council kindly funded. This was the first event of its kind in the UK, was well-attended by representatives of all eight British Isles biospheres, and proved a great success.

The Natural Heritage remit was delivered, with particular emphasis on delivering the ecosystem approach to land management for example via focused conversations with key land managing interests and working with Forestry Commission Scotland to deliver a methodology for including biosphere objectives for woodland in the SRDP Forestry Grant Scheme.

#### Period April 2017- November 2017

With the groundwork in place, we have made significant progress since the end of March. The following report provides a summary of the main initiatives undertaken in addition to the routine work and involvement with other projects such as Ayrshire Food Festival, Galloway Glens Landscape Partnership Scheme and East Ayrshire Coalfields Landscape Partnership Scheme.

#### Resources

Staff resources are as described above but resourcing our Natural Heritage role has been more problematic and has continued on a very restricted basis with welcome in-kind support form Dumfries and Galloway Council. Dealing with this issue is a priority for the future.

## **Partnership Board Restructuring**

Refreshing and restructuring the Partnership Board has been successfully done. The unwieldy structure has been replaced with a slimmed-down version of sixteen members, including four new recruits from the business and community sectors. A small group is fulfilling the dual role of Trustees and Management Committee. Meeting between Board meetings with the support of Officers it should allow the Board to exercise a clearer leadership role.

#### **Working with Business**

We now have over ninety businesses who have signed up to the Biosphere Charter. We have moved forward with the Accreditation Scheme which will enable businesses with products or services aligned to the biosphere ethos to use this as a marketing and branding tool. The scheme is being piloted with three businesses with the intention of launching fully mid-2018.

Our socio-economic base-line study which will help us to monitor progress has been completed by University of Glasgow and was launched in September.

#### **Working with Communities**

Communities which sign up as 'Proud Supporters' have the opportunity, working with the Sense of Place toolkit, to identify their special features and be promoted on the website as Biosphere Communities and destinations in the Biosphere. As funds allow they can acquire town entrance signs. Glentrool and Gatehouse of Fleet have already taken part with Whithorn and St John's Town of Dalry in the pipeline and Dalmellington expressing an interest.

If successful, an application for financial funding submitted to the Heritage Lottery Fund Great Place Scheme will provide a great boost to this community engagement. It would allow us to employ two Project Officers for two years to work with communities in three distinctive landscape areas. Having been shortlisted we now await the outcome of a full application.

### **Working with Students**

We made significant progress in developing our education remit when we launched the Ayrshire Learning Partnership with Ayrshire College in September. The aim is to create live briefs for students that have a focus on the Biosphere. The current focus is on Creative Industries students linking Biosphere sounds and images, while Tourism students are planning a Biosphere event and promotional blogs.

#### **International Focus**

A great strength of the biosphere designation is that it is an international accolade and we are determined to make the most of this by being an outward-looking organisation. At the same time we have to be selective to form links which have real relevance and value for our local work.

We were pleased to be very closely involved in partnership with Forest Enterprise in hosting an international Dark Skies Conference in Gatehouse of Fleet in September. Attracting visitors from all over the world, and prominent Scottish figures such as the Cabinet Secretary for the Environment and Climate Change and the Chair of Visit Scotland, it provided an excellent opportunity to raise awareness of the Biosphere and its symbiotic relationship to the Dark Skies designation.

The following month we were able to send our Natural Heritage and Carbon Centre Officer and an Officer from the Coalfields Environment Initiative to the first World Youth Forum for Biospheres in Italy. They came back full of enthusiasm and ideas for engaging young people and we look forward to delivering some of these aspirations in south west Scotland.

We are engaged in a Northern Peripheries and Arctic project (SHAPE) led by UHI to explore the sustainable tourism potential of natural and cultural heritage in areas such as Biospheres. This work is very relevant to GSAB and has provided the funding to extend our Business Development Officer to full-time — a win-win situation in terms of funding and international contact.

#### **The Future**

Funding, particularly in respect of the Natural Heritage function remains a challenge. We also have to work to overcome the lack of recognition at all levels of the UNESCO biosphere designation. Both of these are challenges which we share with other UK Biospheres and indeed even wider. We work with UKMAB in addressing this and in April, courtesy of Emma Harper MSP, hosted a reception at Holyrood along with Wester Ross Biosphere to raise awareness among MSPs and other opinion-formers.

We also have to convince Visit Scotland to see the full destination potential of all UNESCO designations, including biospheres.

A significant project in the pipeline is a Land Use conference planned for January to discuss the future for sustainable land-use, particularly in upland areas in the light of Brexit and other policy developments. We believe this to be of crucial importance to the biodiversity, landscape and rural economy and builds on conversations we have already started with land managers.

In conclusion it has been a very busy, stimulating year with solid achievements and lots of ideas for the future. I would like to thank the Staff Team, Board Members and partners for their energy, enthusiasm and commitment to the biosphere ethos.
